1) European Solidarity Centre

Plac Solidarności 1, Gdańsk

The European Solidarity Centre is a state-of-the-art cultural institution that honours our greatest civic success—the victorious Solidarity movement. It is a museum that commemorates the revolution of Solidarity and the fall of communism in Europe, but it is also an educational, research and academic centre, an archive, library and multimedia library. Last but not least, it is a public meeting space for citizens who feel responsible for the development of democracy: a place where solidarity and citizenship are put into practice.

2) Museum of the Second World War

Plac Władysława Bartoszewskiego 1, Gdańsk

The Museum of the Second World War is built on a lot at Władysław Bartoszewski Square near the centre of the city. It is located in a symbolic architectural space, which is also a space of memory, 200 metres from the historic Polish Post Office in Gdańsk and 3 kilometres across the water from Westerplatte Peninsula, both of which were attacked in September 1939.

3) Museum of Gdansk - Main Town Hall

ul. Długa 46/47, Gdańsk

The Main Town Hall is a Gothic and Renaissance building situated at the junction of ul. Długa and Długi Targ. Its construction overlooks the Royal Road, the most representative tract of the historic part of the city. The most important parts of the Town Hall, housing a permanent exhibition, are: the Hall, the White Room and the Red Room. In high season, for an additional fee of PLN 5, tourists can climb up on to the roof walk in the tower. Located about 50 m above ground, from here you can admire the magnificent panorama of Gdansk.

4) Museum of Gdansk - Museum of Amber

ul. Targ Węglowy 26, Gdańsk

A visit to Gdansk would not be complete without visiting the Amber Museum. Gdansk is the capital city of this beautiful stone. The museum tells the story of the origins of amber, its properties, extraction and its processing throughout the centuries, from the ancient times to modernity. It features a unique collection of natural specimens — a priceless selection of natural amber forms, including large lumps, plant and animal inclusions, unique colours and shades, as well as various fossilised resins that can be found across the globe.

5) National Maritime Museum - the Crane

ul. Szeroka 67/68, Gdańsk

The Crane is one of the landmarks of Gdansk and the oldest preserved harbour crane in Europe. It was constructed between 1442 and 1444 in the form of two brick towers with a wooden crane mechanism installed between them. It served as a reloading crane, a defensive construction and the city gate. The Crane hosts an exhibition on the life of the harbour city between the 16th and 18th century. After having walked up the narrow, wooden steps to the highest floor of the Crane, which is about 27 m above ground, tourists can admire the panorama of the Motława river, Ołowianka Island, Granary Island and the yachts moored in the marina.

6) National Museum in Gdansk - Old Art Branch

ul. Toruńska 1, Gdańsk

The museum's pride is the "Last Judgement" triptych by Hans Memling (1433–1494), one of the major art pieces of 15th century European art. Moreover, the branch also presents the collections of Gdansk and Netherlander paintings, gold jewellery, pottery, as well as Gdansk and north European furniture dating back to the 16th and 18th century. All these items are available to see during permanent exhibitions, as well as numerous temporary exhibitions under various themes.
